A few months ago, I shared exciting news that Congregation Schaarai Zedek was embarking on a Strategic Planning process.

I am pleased to announce that work is well underway, and we successfully completed the initial Strategic Plan Kickoff Session on March 23, 2024. About 30 congregants attended, including Rabbi Simon and

Marc LeVine representing the Staff Team, and we spent the entire day (!) identifying the 5 focus areas to be addressed by the Strategic Plan:

- Organizational Excellence
- Facility
- Congregant Experience
- Revenue and Finance
- Education and Youth

The Organizational Excellence group will work on assessing CSZ's staffing needs and organizational structure, and ensuring there are clear job and performance roles and metrics for Staff, Clergy, and the Board of Trustees.

The Facility group will identify the current and future facility needs of CSZ and develop a master plan to accommodate those needs.

The Congregant Experience group will focus on the engagement of

our congregants and the community at large through our programming and experiences.

The Revenue and Finance group will focus on ways to diversify revenue at CSZ, as well as creating fiscal practices and policies for fundraising, Torah Circle, Endowment, and long-range planning.

The Education and Youth group will develop opportunities to create educational programming that fosters Jewish identity, retention, and community.

The Strategic Planning Leadership Team selected the group leaders for each of these focus groups, and several groups have already begun their meetings. A congregant survey will also be conducted as part of the strategic planning process. We hope to report the results from those meetings and the survey to the Board of Trustees and the Congregation in Summer 2024.

Thank you again to all of our Strategic Plan Kickoff Session attendees who gave their entire Saturday to this process and thank you to our group leaders and group members who have graciously volunteered to continue this work. Congregation Schaarai Zedek is blessed to have so many skilled and devoted lay leaders. If you're interested in participating there is still plenty of time, so please contact me if have any input you would like to share or if you would like to be in one of the focus groups listed above. \$\sigma\$

### Rabbi Simon's Remarks from the Annual Meeting

n 1968, Spencer Silver, a researcher at 3M, while attempting to create a new kind of "super strength" adhesive for the aerospace industry failed miserably. He was left with an adhesive so weak that it could barely hold up anything, and it peeled right off without leaving anything behind. While the project was originally deemed a failure, it was six years later that Silver's colleague, Art Fry, remembered the project while trying to find a way to bookmark his hymnal at church, and *voila*, the post it note was born. (As a fun side note, the only color of scrap paper available when Fry created the prototype? - yellow...)

And so it was, 50 years after those original yellow sticky notes were created that 30 of your fellow community members found ourselves each with a pad of sticky notes in front of us, and soon after surrounded by them, as we were each asked to identify what we saw as the congregation's strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats, and later those things that we thought we should start doing that we weren't currently doing, stop doing that we were, and those things we deemed successful that should continue.

Similar to the Talmudic premise in which even the minority opinions are preserved, every sticky note would be recorded

and viewed as an important viewpoint, but we would be looking for trends in order to find areas of consensus that would become the focus of our strategic plan, first looking at the next year, ultimately giving us focus for the next five years.

We would be challenged to look honestly at ourselves as a congregation, and while, of course, we would find challenges we need to overcome and areas of improvement, it was so heartening to see the way in which these were all rooted in the incredible place in which we find ourselves as a congregation. In other words, our weaknesses were almost always a product of our strengths.

Each sticky note seemed to be interconnected to all of the others. As the room became covered in different colors (we went far beyond the original yellow), we saw an immense appreciation for our programming which spans the generations and recognition and praise for the incredible staff and clergy that create and support it. And even as we questioned which demographics we might still be missing, there was an accompanying recognition of how hard everyone is working, leading us to see the need to look at our organizational structure and what changes would be needed to do the things we want to start and continue doing. The same questions will be asked of our facility, leading to the inevitable question of what sustainable funding would be needed in order to support any suggested growth. And lastly, while we learned so much during Covid and were primed like few others to thrive as a congregation through those challenges, we also were left in a different world and need to look at how we are reaching congregants of all ages, including our responsibility to create our next generation of Jews in this new world.

There were some lighter moments - we avoided diving too deep into whether our challah should come from Publix or a different bakery - but perhaps the highlight of the day came in the form of one sticky note found on the "continue" page - "May Congregation Schaarai Zedek continue forever."

Friends, this Fall we will celebrate our congregation's 130th birthday, and as we do, we can be so proud of who we are. We honor our builders and the visionaries who have guided us over the years. How special is it to have the Zielonkas here tonight along with Dan Singer, Rabbi Sundheim's grandson, and of course, Rabbi Birnholz and Donna? How many congregations can say that three generations of rabbinic leadership, spanning 94 years, are still present and active within the community? We honor our present and the incredible team of people who are devoting their lives

### **The Deadliest Poison**

#### Navigating a Toxic World: Lessons from Myth and Torah on Resisting the Poison of Hate

here's a kind of Chinese black magic I've read about called "gu." In short, the premise of the ritual is that you put multiple poisonous animals (snakes, scorpions, centipedes, etc.) in a jar, where inevitably, they will fight to the death and consume each other. The last creature alive is thought to have concentrated all of the toxins in itself, creating a far more powerful and deadly poison called gu. Now, scholars have suggested that the rumors of this poison functioned similarly to rumors of witchcraft in many western societies, as a way to oppress ethnic minorities and women. But the anxiety of toxicity amplifying toxicity is one that I think speaks to the world in which we live.

This is a toxic time, partly due to a legacy media and social media landscape that incentivizes conflict and strong negative feelings as a way of generating ad revenue, but also because of an extreme rise in hatreds of all varieties, antisemitism in particular. There are so many ways that

being hated can change us. It can instill fear, pride, anger, despair, or hopelessness. Each of us is going to respond to the moment differently, but there is one path forward of which we should be especially wary: absorbing the poison and becoming hateful ourselves.

There's something cathartic about hating. From so many movies and news clips, we can see in our minds the image of crowds frothing at the idea of an "other," someone else who is the root of their problems. This fear of the other seems built into us, and there are certainly those who are willing to take advantage of it for power or other benefits. I can't, however, say that Judaism tells us bar none to not hate our enemy or someone who hates us. We are told to blot out the name of Amalek. We are told that when someone tries to kill you, rise up and strike first. But the first chapter of the Torah tells us all we need to really know: all humanity is made in the image of God, and there is nothing more precious than human life.

For the mythical gu, its deadliness can only increase as the creatures kill

and consume each other. But in the Babylonian Talmud, in Yoma 72b, the rabbis teach us that the Torah can be both an elixir of life or a deadly poison. Depending on how we choose to use and read it, the Torah can help us honor life and its incredible potential, or it can become a tool by which we justify our hate of the other, close ourselves off, and return to the ghetto by our own hands. The great Rabbi Hillel teaches that in a place where no one is behaving like a human, we must strive to be humane. We may be in that jar right now, surrounded by venomous creatures, and while we have the imperative to survive, we also cannot let it change us by replacing our capacity to love with something darker and more hateful. There will come a time when the fighting and hate will end. Let us ensure that we emerge with our scars reminding us that the empathy and kindness at the root of Torah are our greatest tool in fulfilling the purpose that God gave to us, to be rodfei shalom, passionate and ceaseless pursuers of peace. \$\primex\$

# Finding Home: Reflections on Reunion and Connection

Welcome Home!"—An exclamation of joy between friends and family upon reunification and arrival. Generational celebrations unfold at airport gates with signs and balloons, children running to adults or partners meeting in embrace. Packed cars, laden to the top, ferry 20-somethings back to childhood homes from semesters and adventures. Recollecting your last "Welcome Home!" moment is likely not difficult. It matters little whether you are the party doing the welcoming or being welcomed; the surge of positive energy in that moment is undeniable.

As we approach this time of the year, I contemplate all the places I have called "home" and the people who have rendered those places meaningful.

Earlier this summer, I spent a weekend in St. Louis with my dad and Lawton, my son. Though I graduated from high school in St. Louis, I have never truly considered the area 'home.' We moved when I was in 9th grade, and after graduation, I found myself returning only to see family for


brief spells. It was more common for us to convene in other cities for family events or vacations. Driving around town, essentially a tourist in a city my family has resided in for the better part of 30 years, it became apparent how deeply my time in St. Louis altered the trajectory of my life and career.

quick visits—a summer between semesters, a pit-stop before "what's next," or a journey to find their first or next adult 'home.' After 15 years at Schaarai Zedek, there are generations of young adults who walk through our doors, and my instinctual greeting is always "Welcome Home!" The connections and foundational development within our congregational walls have forged bonds for these adults, who find meaning in returning to Schaarai Zedek when they come back to Tampa. As we embark on the first steps of our Strategic Planning, we recognize the power of these connections and the generational impacts for our congregational community. Of paramount importance, and one of my primary goals for all our congregants, is to find a point of connection and to feel that sense of positivity and joy when you walk through our doors.

Whether it is for the first time this week or the first time in months, I eagerly anticipate seeing you at an upcoming event at CSZ, and I hope you will share with me the ways we currently make CSZ feel like home.



### **Cultivating Jewish Connections at Every Stage**

Five kids sprawled out with countless decks of cards while four parents enjoyed good food and wine. For the Litwak and Burack families, summer vacations are a cornerstone of family life. Whether meeting in Hilton Head Island, Colorado, the Grand Canyon, or Israel, my sisters and I eagerly awaited vacations with our best family friends.

Although our joint vacations have become less frequent as we've reached our 20s, the times we do get together are filled with reminiscing. Our recent trip to Disney World included Marissa asking all three Litwak girls to be bridesmaids in her wedding. Our renewed Teenokot program, led by Program Coordinator Sarah Smith, serves families with little ones, ages 0-3, and will meet monthly on Thursday mornings beginning in August. We're excited for Sarah to bring new ideas to Teenokot and continue our Tot Shabbat services.

As our CSZ kids grow, they can engage through Primary Shabbat (K-2nd grade), Youth Group (K-12th grade), and Religious School (PreK-12th grade). Primary Shabbat introduces kids to services in a kid-friendly environment. Youth groups for K-12 allow kids to bond with peers. Parents can also connect through Grade Level Brunches for grades 3-6, beginning in December. These Sunday mornings offer parents with same-aged children a chance to get to know each other. Our new Madrichim program for 10th-12th graders provides older teens with community service, leadership skills, and bonding opportunities.

Our goal at Congregation Schaarai Zedek is to create a safe, welcoming, and engaging community where congregants find joy, support, and meaningful connections. My relationship with the Buracks, rooted in our Jewish community, inspires me to help others find similar connections for themselves and their families. I look forward to the year ahead with all of you!





to making sure that the needs of this community are met. We are successful because every person who works and volunteers their leadership within these walls has a love for our mission and a love for our members, a shared belief of who we are and the impact that we make.

And as we honor who we are, we celebrate that which we can still become. For unlike that weak adhesive on a sticky note that leaves no trace once the page is gone, this congregation has left an incredible and permanent mark on each of our members over that 130 years and on this Tampa community. During an extremely difficult year in the Jewish world, as we saw the worst attack on the Jewish community since the Holocaust, praying for our brothers and sisters in Israel even as we've witnessed scenes on college

campuses that we never could have imagined in our own country, we have been a refuge of safety. We are grateful for the security team that protects us as family, and we are grateful for these walls of refuge that have provided social and spiritual safety for us at the same time. It is that foundation that makes any potential future change and growth that much more important and exciting.

Last week, as we finished the Book of Leviticus, we said the words, "Chazak chazak v'nitchazeik - Be strong, be strong, that we all may be strengthened." Just as was written on that oh so special sticky note, may the strength of our Congregation Schaarai Zedek continue forever, and may that strength be a source of strength for each of our members, for our Tampa community, and God willing, for the wider world.
